The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) is pleased to announce **Intramural NIAID Research Opportunities/ (INRO)**, a program for underrepresented minority students interested in exploring a research career in the areas of allergy, immunology, and infectious diseases. NIAID is seeking qualified applicants for the 5-day program to be held February 3–7, 2008, at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland.

Students selected to attend INRO 2008 will learn about the Institute and about training opportunities available at NIAID.
